Georg Philipp Telemann is the most productive composer of all times (with over 3.000 compositions, more than Bach and Händel together, who lived in the same era).

The fourth (and last) movement of the Sonata for two chalumeaux is a fast but not difficult short piece. The second and third voice represent the two chalumeaux, which are predecessors of the clarinet.

This sonata originally has four parts, but in the arrangement a continuo part was added (fourth voice) and there are four bars in which the second voice plays a second violin part (that does not appear in the original as it was written for just one violin).
