John Stanley (1712-1786) was an English composer and organist. He wrote several sets of voluntaries for organ, some of which have often been played by trumpet and organ, and then called Trumpet Voluntary. The Voluntary opus 6 nr. 5 is one of these, normally using a trumpet register on the organ, but often played using a real trumpet. The arrangement for accordion quintet contains only the most popular part: the Andante Largo. Care should be taken to make the first voice sound more like a trumpet (using LMH 8va) and the other voices more like an organ. As the first voice only contains the parts intended for

When using the LMH 8va register the first voice requires a high B. It also helps to have a (button) accordion going down to low D for the fourth voice but this isn't really necessary.

trumpet the arrangement can also be played by trumpet plus accordion

This arrangement is quite easy to play. (After all, everything is normally played by just one organ player...)
